## MANAGERS ARE VISITORS TO TRAILER CITY

A contingent of Met-Ed division and district managers got a first-hand look at the Company's Trailer City operations today about a week after the 30-trailer mobile office complex sprang from the lava of the Three Mile Island Observation Center.

Several of the managers saw some of their division or district employees at work who were recruited to aid the Trailer City development and support needs.

During the group's first area stop at Middletown's Crawford Station, Henry L. Rebidoux, vice president of operations, explained how Trailer City was assembled hours after the nuclear accident, to accommodate an influx of utility and nuclear industry experts who converged on the site. Rebidoux, who headed the Trailer City development effort, acknowledged the support and cooperation of the managers who sent personnel and materials needed to establish a functional trailer city.

Organizational arrangements for the day's activities were formulated by William R. Gross, information coordinator at the Observation Center. Tour guides for the trailer city complex were Eric Ulrich, manager-forestry, Jack Thomas, director-public affairs, and Charlie O'Neill, supervisor of finance. They explained the functions of each trailer, ranging from radiation monitoring and regulatory activities to "The Timbers" dining area and the adjacent heliport.

## OPERATORS WELL QUALIFIED

At an open meeting of the U. S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission and its staff on April 4, in Washington, the qualifications of the TMI-2 operators was discussed. In reply to a question by Commissioner Richard T. Kennedy, Daryl Eisenhart, a member of the NRC technical staff said "They're a well qualified group of operators of high caliber".

We are presently serving approximately 2000 meals a day. We are willing to continue to provide meals to personnel who are unable to obtain meals or provide a lunch at their normal home location. 

## Still In Favor Of Nuclear Power

Public Opinion Poll  
On Three Mile Island

After the accident at Three Mile Island, 73 percent of those surveyed said they wanted to start up again (53 percent "definitely"), while 25 percent, one out of three, said the plant should never be turned on. As far as the accident being told the truth about the reactor at Three Mile Island, 52 percent felt they were told the whole story, another 12 percent wasn't. Conversely, one out of four said the unit was "not serious," but had been most of proportion.

However, My guess is that 10 percent will keep asking the questions, but for the rest, it's back to normal. They're out plowing or going about their business. The thing is over, the government's going to clean it up and we don't have to worry about it."

Dr. Krabill's poll, in which he was assisted by three other professors and about 10 students, was conducted by telephone over a period of one week — Monday, April 6 through Sunday — and takes in the telephone exchanges of 444, 387 and 475, which includes the boroughs of Middletown, Marietta and Elizabethtown. In all, 275 people, randomly selected by a computer, were asked 11 basic questions on the incident. Those questioned all lived within 15 miles of the plant, which was the scene of a nuclear accident that caused widespread evacuation in the area and added words like "nuclear" and "hydrogen bubble" to the everyday vocabulary.

"I think they're still in favor of

nuclear power," said Dr. Krabill.

He said that 73 percent of the respondents wanted to turn on the plant again.

He also found that 53 percent of the residents in the area, packed up and left during the week-long crisis. It was estimated the town had a population of 21,000, with the vast majority evacuated.

"I think there's a desire to live here, but I think there's a desire to leave here, too," said Dr. Krabill.

"I think the people here are afraid, the people around the plant are afraid. You ask me one of the chances of it exploding again, I'm not so sure, but I'm going to be the safest plant to live nearby. There's an interesting psychological thing that happens. What I'm suggesting is that people living near other plants are going to be more afraid than those living here."

"I also think the people living here accept authority more than they do in other areas. I think they're reluctant to become politically involved. You won't find them doing a lot of marching. That is just my personal opinion."

In the poll, people were asked:

"Do you support the use of nuclear power as a source of energy for our nation?"

Locally, 62 percent responded "yes," 27 "no" and 11 "don't know."

Asked, "Do you think the nuclear plant near Middletown should operate again in the future?" 25 percent answered with a qualified "yes" ("if they keep better control of it," "well, we need electricity"); 21 percent gave a flat "no"; while 35 percent, or more than one third, said the plant should not fire up again. That left seven percent who responded "don't know."
