THE HEARINGS TESTIMONY

ST. LOUIS, Mo., - The accident to TMI's Unit No. 2 today was termed "a result of a series of human errors, bad calculations and human factors," according to Dieckamp, TMI President.

Dieckamp also appeared in Washington before the Subcommittee on Nuclear Regulation of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee.

At the same hearing, GUE Chairman William G. Rehns estimated that the uninsured current monthly costs of the accident were about \$12 million, \$24 million for replacement energy and \$8 million related fixed charges, apart from associated tax costs. He noted that the replacement energy costs would drop by about \$14 million when Three Mile Island Unit No. 1 is restored to service and that strenuous efforts were being made to reduce further the replacement energy costs.

Rehns referred to a National Economic Research Associates economic study whose preliminary results suggest a nationwide \$2 billion annual increase in capital financing costs for nuclear utilities if the costs of the accident were not shared.

Reviewing the accident, Dieckamp stated, "At the outset we would like to emphasize that we do not in any way wish to minimize the significance of this accident and we seek no excuse from our responsibilities as plant owners and operators. We strongly believe that it is important to understand the factors which contributed to this accident and to the ability of our company, government agencies and the population to cope with it."

He said the company was "in general agreement with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission testimony" concerning the sequence of events of the accident.

Referring to the accident as described as a "first of a kind" accident at a commercial nuclear reactor, Dieckamp said that as a result of the accident "all parties should be more aware of the importance of this kind of situation and better prepared to cope in terms of leadership, manpower and material resources."

In his prepared testimony Dieckamp also made these points: "Control room operators were a qualified and competent group who "performed their functions professionally in a period of extreme stress."

- Unit No. 2 will be brought to cold shut down stage in two to three weeks.
- The relationship between the company and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) personnel "is one of mutual respect and cooperation."
- Release of radiation as a result of the accident did not constitute a significant health hazard.
- The company's emergency plan "was effectively implemented."

g the 1983 financial outlook for the damaged unit, Blackamp said that it was too early to provide even a rough estimate of cost estimate for the repair of Unit 1 of TMI-2. However, he added, "Experience with the cleanup of the first four fuel rods indicates that the problem is technically manageable."

Identified two major groups of uninsured costs, namely, (1) replacement power costs of \$1 million for each month both TMI units are out of service and \$10 million per month for Unit 1, which was not involved in the accident, is returned to service; and (2) fixed siting charges for TMI-2 (apart from associated tax costs) of about \$3 million per month reflects interest on bonds, preferred stock dividends, depreciation and other on-staff earnings requirements.

stated that if these costs were not shared by customers as well as investors and employees, that customers locally and throughout the nation would suffer, noting that utilities, commercial bankers and insurance companies have recognized that electric utilities throughout the nation would be affected.

In his testimony, Kuhns said, "All the economies achieved from application of new technologies, improved productivity and the like have been passed along to customers, as will be." As examples, Kuhns specifically cited savings from GPU's two nuclear power plants, Oyster Creek and TMI-1. Because of the two, Kuhns explained, GPU's customers could continue savings of about \$150 million annually.

"Our customers have received no part of these savings that Oyster Creek and Three Mile Island I have produced. All of the benefits have gone to our customers."

RUMORS --- SPEAK FROM FACTS

ACTION DEFERRED

Net-Ed President Walter Greitz defended the Company's handling of the TMI accident and denied that Company spokesmen misled the public. "We tried at all times to tell the public as we saw it. The unfortunate thing is, we didn't know the total extent of the accident until several days later," he said. Greitz remarks were published in Sunday's Reading Eagle, and carried in wire stories around the country in today's papers.
